HAPPENING THIS MONTH...

The BBC reaches the one-year deadline set by the BBC Trust to improve its daytime programming. Last November, the governing body which assesses the corporation's output on behalf of the fee payer found there were not enough drama or current affairs programmes and too many programmes about collectibles and property.

Tuesday 1 November

The Chartered Institute of Purchasing and Supply (CIPS) release its manufacturing figures for October.

UK Foreign Secretary William Hague hosts the International Conference of Cyberspace in London. Over 80 governments and international organisations will discuss cybercrime and the "norms of social behaviour in cyberspace".

Thursday 3 November

The Independent Parliamentary Standards Authority publishes MPs' expenses claimed in June and July 2011.

Prime Minister David Cameron attends the 6th G20 Summit in Cannes. French President Nicolas Sarkozy will host the premier forum for discussing financial markets and the world economy.

Saturday 5 November

The date which 'Anonymous' is threatening to "kill

Facebook". The hacking group plans to destroy the social networking giant, accusing it of abusing user privacy. If successful, over 750 million accounts could be deleted.

Monday 7 November

Irish Republicans Colin Duffy and Brian Shivers go on trial for the murder of British soldiers Patrick Azimkar and Mark Quinsey. The pair were gunned down in 2009 at Massereene Barracks in Northern Ireland. Duffy and Shivers both plead not guilty.

Wednesday 9 November

The National Gallery opens its doors to the most complete collection of works by Leonardo Da Vinci to date. Leonardo Da Vinci: Painter At The Court Of Milan promises to be one of the most popular art exhibitions ever.

Sunday 13 November

On Remembrance Day, the nation will commemorate the sacrifices made by members of the armed forces and by civilians in times of war. The Queen will lay a wreath dedicated to all those who have died or suffered during The National Service Of Remembrance on Whitehall.

Monday 14 November

Prime Minister David Cameron delivers the keynote address dedicated to Foreign Policy at the Lord Mayor's Banquet at London's Guildhall. Last year, Cameron stressed Britain's position as a "major player in the world" as well as a need to "sort out" its economy.

Tuesday 15 November

The Bank Of England announces its latest monthly inflation figures.

Wednesday 16 November

The Bank of England publishes its quarterly inflation report. Following August's report, Governor Mervyn King warned that inflation was on course to hit 5% before the end of the year.

The Office for National Statistics announces its latest monthly unemployment figures.

Westminster Abbey marks the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible with a special service celebrating its place in culture and the continuing significance of the text. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, will deliver the address.

Thursday 17 November

UK monthly sales figures are released for October.

Monday 21 November

The Confederation of British Industry (CBI) hosts its annual conference. This year focuses on 'Accelerating growth - breaking and entering new markets'.

Monday 28 November

An inquest will be held into the death of six-year-old Liam Hogan who suffered fatal head injuries when he fell 15 metres from a balcony in Crete. He was reportedly pushed by his father John Hogan who afterwards jumped while holding his daughter Mia's hand. John and Mia Hogan both survived.

The Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors publishes

its October Housing Market Survey.

Wednesday 30 November

The TUC day of action. Nearly three million people are estimated to protest against the government's decision to increase workers' pension contribution payments. It is anticipated that it will be the biggest mass walkout since the 1926 General Strike.
